## THANKSGIVING

Once again, so suddenly, we find it is time for Thanksgiving. Even though we should be thankful the year round, we especially tend to think of this time of year as the time for Thanksgiving. We think of a golden harvest, the warm feeling of fellowship when the family is together, and always, the traditional turkey and feast on Thanksgiving Day.

Our first Thanksgivings were harvest festivals. Thanksgiving was celebrated around the world, even before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth. The Pilgrims had their first period of Thanksgiving about a year after they landed at Plymouth. This was in the summer of 1621, when Governor Bradford ordered a three-day feast held to give thanks to God for a safe trip and bounteous crop. In 1623, he made July 30 the first official Thanksgiving day. Gradually these customs spread throughout the other colonies and many special days were set aside for Thanksgiving. President Lincoln, in November, 1863, proclaimed an official date for Thanksgiving. Each year after that, all the presidents used the same day. Then, in 1939, President Roosevelt set it one week earlier. He wanted to help business by lengthening the period before Christmas. Congress ruled that, after 1941, the fourth Thursday in November would be observed as Thanksgiving Day. Thus we see that our custom of a Thanksgiving Day is indeed an old custom, observed around the world.

Let us all remember, at this Thanksgiving season, to thank God for the many things we so often take for granted, such as a free country, our homes and families, and many, many, other personal blessings God has so graciously bestowed upon us. Let us all try to make this the best Thanksgiving we have ever had by simply giving thanks.

This ended the regular game season for Lyons. The Bulldogs racked up 9 wins against one loss and scored a total of 304 points to 34 for their opponents.

In the sub-region 2-B grid playoff with Hawkinsville in Dublin, the Red Devils seemed to pull a fast one on the Bulldogs and won the sub-region crown.

Hawkinsville go on the scoreboard first by going over from the two. On a drive that started

off from passes, the Devils scored again from the four. The Bulldogs came back and went in from the 6 with Richard Brown crashing over. Hawkinsville led 14-6 at half-time. The 3rd qtr. was all dogs but the 4th qtr. was all Devil as they intercepted 4 Lyons passes which, off one, set up Hawkinsville's final TD for their 20 to 6 win. It was a bad night for the Bulldogs all around. This ended Lyons' glorious football season. Although we didn't win the 2-B Sub-Region crown, we can say we won the central crown.

Our first Fall District Meeting was held at Savannah High School on October 31. Our speaker was Dr. Flaride Moore Gardner, who is a Professor of Education Woman's College of Georgia. She makes many speeches and is very much in demand for public speaking.

On speaking about Education-An Endless Challenge Dr. Moore encouraged girls to keep learning and to stay in school and to try for college where there are many more opportunities. She said girls make slightly better grades than boys, but more girls drop out of school than boys. She encouraged us to go to college and said that colleges all over the nation are expecting us. And for those who cannot go to college, more vocational schools are open and wanting you to train for a vocation, opportunities are endless she said.

If you are in high school and enrolled in Home Economics and can see your way clear to go to college most promising careers will be associated with Home Economics more opportunities opened to you in any other field. Ninety percent of the women in the U.S. are employed at some time during their life outside of the home. Dr. Gardner left us with the idea that it would be wonderful if we could have our education combined with our home and with our career.

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### WHAT IS DCT?

Diversified Cooperative Training is a work-study program of vocational education in Georgia high schools. The Lyons DCT program is one of 55 programs in the State of Georgia.

DCT is based on the belief that a student gains from work experience while still in high school. A student must be interested, he must be 16 years of age and a junior or senior.

The students will divide their time between school and their job. They will receive one unit for class and one unit for working.

When the schools and business work together everyone has the opportunity to benefit, in other words, the students use the community as a laboratory for gaining experience.

The Lyons DCT program consists of 32 working students who earn while they learn under actual job conditions.

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## FTA MEETS IN STATESBORO

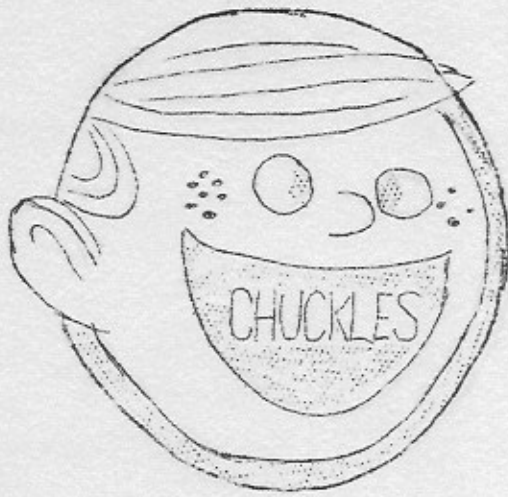
